Section 2: Certifications

C. NIJ Body Armor Standards

Applicant assures that body armor purchased with grant funds will comply with the National Institute of Justice (NIJ) standard (Ballistic Resistance of Body Armor NIJ Standard-0101.06) for type III (rifles) or type IV (armor piercing rifle) body armor, including bullet-resistant vests, ballistic plates, and plate carriers.

D. Personally Fitted Vest Requirement

Applicant assures that all body armor vests purchased with grant funds will be personally fitted for individual officers, including vests specifically fitted to individual female law enforcement officers. "Personally fitted" does not require armor be individually manufactured based on the measurements of a specific wearer, but rather that it provide the best possible fit and coverage, through a combination of:

- 1. Correctly-sized panels and carrier, determined through appropriate measurement; and
- 2. Properly adjusted straps, harnesses, fasteners, flaps, or other adjustable features.

The American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) International has made available the Standard Practice for Body Armor Wearer Measurement and Fitting of Armor (<u>Active Standard ASTM E3003</u>) available at no cost. The Personal Armor Fit Assessment <u>checklist</u>, is excerpted from ASTM E3003.

E. Uniform Crime Reports

Eligible applicants operating a law enforcement agency must be current on reporting Part I violent crime data to the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) for inclusion in the annual Uniform Crime Report (UCR). To be considered eligible for funding, applicants must have submitted a full twelve months of accurate data to DPS for the most recent calendar year.

F. Criminal History Reporting

The county (or counties) in which the applicant is located must have a 90% average on both adult and juvenile criminal history dispositions reported to the Texas Department of Public Safety for calendar years 2012 through 2016, as of August 31, 2017.

Project Abstract:

1.) DUTIES: A. Tactical Response: The Emergency Response Team (ERT) functions primarily the same as a SWAT Team, and consists of 12 specially trained deputies throughout the agency. The ERT responds to all "High Risk" Operations such as active shootings, barricaded persons, high risk warrant service, or any other incident that places significant risk against public or officer safety. The members of the ERT Team are called out the to the worse possible scenarios because they train to perform as a Team in their team movements, providing cover to team members, entry into structures, or respond in areas that requires specialized training. Also members of the ERT Team are called into the correctional facility to perform jail cell extractions or to control jail uprisings. The ERT Team currently has no specific tactical gear that they use and rely heavily on ballistic equipment that they would use in normal patrol duties, which does not meet tactical standards as they are always exposed to a higher threat level. B. Traffic or Highway Patrol: Currently there are 63 sworn personnel that are assigned to the Uniformed Division, which includes Patrol, Warrants, SRO Personnel, and Courthouse deputies. All of these deputies are first responders and have responsibilities that require that they respond to calls for service and execute arrest or search warrants as part of their normal duties. The patrol deputies are on street and respond to calls for service throughout Johnson County, which includes calls that are in progress such as disturbances, disturbances with weapons, fights in progress, shooting, robberies, and many other calls with the propensity of violence. The Warrants personnel are not only out serving felony and misdemeanor warrants they are also supplementing patrol, transporting violent prisoners, and respond to persons that are in mental crisis. The School Resource Officer's (SRO) work a law enforcement setting inside the school, which over the years has been a prime target for violence. They patrol both inside and outside the school building and campuses, deal with hostile situations within the school that may involve disgruntled parents, students in mental crisis, and handle volatile custody disputes. The deputies assigned to work at the courthouse have constant interaction with the public and are assigned to work in an environment that has been targeted many times in the past. The people entering the courthouse are people that may be wanting to file paperwork, get a marriage license, or they could be coming to court on drug charges, aggravated assault, domestic violence, or others that have already violated the law in some manner. At the courthouse there have been several incidents of people bringing or attempting to bring weapons into the courthouse, or have altercations and stabbing that occur on the courthouse steps. C. Other Personnel: There are 30 sworn personnel that are part of Administration or Criminal Investigations that are not primarily responding to calls for service. These personnel are active in responding to the needs of the community. Personnel are actively investigating crimes that require them to often be in the field, which can involve working active scenes, serving arrest and search warrants, and supplementing in other areas of the agency as needed. D. Reserves: There are 15 reserve deputies The Reserve Unit (15) serves right alongside full time deputies and provides the same type of service to the community, and are all certified TCOLE Peace Officers. The only difference between a reserve deputy and full time deputy is that one is paid and the other is a volunteer. The Reserve Deputies serve in all areas of the Sheriff's Office but primarily work within the Uniformed Division and respond to same types of calls for service as what the regular deputies, and face the same inherent risk. 2.) HISTORY: A.) On 01/27/2016, a deputy while on patrol observed a 2012 Ford Focus traveling a high rate of speed. When the License Plate was called in dispatch advised him that the person operating the vehicle had just been involved in the theft of a firearm. The deputy pursued the vehicle to where he turned into a driveway. The driver exited the vehicle and fled on foot to a residence and the deputy pursued on foot. The deputy first discharged a taser after he noted that he was carrying a knife in his waistband and the location of the firearm was unknown. The deputy retreated to cover and the suspect firing rounds in the direction of the officers that were now on scene striking a marked unit. An officer at the scene returned fire shooting the subject. B.) On 09/23/2016, Deputies were called to a residence for a reported Disturbance in Progress with Weapons in a rural part of Johnson County. When the initial deputy arrived on scene she made contact with the caller and her father, the victim 72 yoa, who had been shot four times. The assailant his son had fled back into a separate residence, where he barricaded himself. As deputies attempted to negotiate with the suspect with no results. As deputies made entry into the residence the suspect fired rounds at the deputies, and the deputies returned gunfire striking the suspect. The victim later died with multiple gunshot wounds to the abdomen. The altercation was over the suspect stealing his dads AC Unit. C.) On 03/09/2017, Deputies were called to residence within the Godley City limits to assist with a barricaded subject that was armed, suicidal, and had already fired rounds at Police Officers. Negotiators attempted to communicate with the subject with very limited communication. During the incident where the suspect was shooting rounds at police gunfire was returned and the suspect was believed to have been struck. A robot from the Cleburne Police Department was sent into the residence where the suspect was seen lying on the floor not responding. Entry was made into the residence and it was found that the suspect was located, taken into custody, and transported to the hospital for medical care. It was learned that the suspect had found earlier the same day that he had colon cancer. D.) On 07/29/2017 responded to a residence outside of Joshua < TX to a report of a subject firing a gun inside his residence. A family member called in the incident during which communications heard the subject state that he would shoot any police officers that arrived at his residence. As deputies arrived on scene they staged and secured the perimeter of the residence. During this time the subjects wide ran to deputies and told the deputies that her husband was intoxicated and was mad because he thought that she was having a relationship outside of their marriage. The wife further told deputies that the subject fired two rounds at her nearly striking her in the head. The wife informed deputies that the subject had an AR15 styled weapon with three magazines and approximately 250 rounds. The Drone was launched and observed the subject run out of the residence and fire two rounds. The subject then exited the house a second time at which time he entered his truck and attempted to flee the area. The subject was taken into custody a short time later. E.) There have been numerous barricaded subject incidents, which have increasingly become more prevalent in the types of calls that our deputies respond to. The causes of these incidents are attributed to several different factors such as , criminal offenses, heightened disturbances, mental crisis, alcohol, narcotics, and wanting to commit suicide by cop. No longer is there anything routine in the law enforcement officer's world. For Johnson County in April of 2011 deputies responded to a disturbance in progress in the Venus area of Johnson County. The deputies staged, responded to the house only to find that the subject had barricaded the door to an outside shed. The deputies attempted to talk to the subject to come out and when he responded he said simply "I can't". On that day our focus changed in how we approach everything Clifton Taylor gave his life in duty, and it changed the life of everyone involved forever. 3.) Non-Tactical Duties: The Johnson County Ballistic Vest Program does include ballistic vests for our administration, criminal investigators, and reserve deputies. The Administration and Investigators are not normally responding to calls for service, but they are always available to provide support to the Uniformed Division in any manner that is required. On occasion that requires that a Detective or Administrator may put on a uniform and answer calls for service. If a critical incident is occurring it is almost absolute that an investigator or administrator is going to respond to assist or assume command of an active scene. Administrators and Investigators spend a lot of time in the field working active investigations, serving search and arrest warrants, locating suspects, or performing any other amount of tasks that require that they be out in the field. The reserve deputies serve alongside patrol deputies responding to calls for service, taking part in making traffic stops, taking disturbance calls, or performing all the same duties as a patrol deputy. Reserve Deputies are a special group of people that perform in this dangerous profession to give back to their community. Reserve Deputies are required to work a minimum of 16 hours per month. 4.)
