**MEMORANDUM OF DONATION  
TO JOHNSON COUNTY HISTORICAL COMMISSION**

**STATE OF TEXAS §**

**KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:**

**COUNTY OF JOHNSON §**

Comes now, PAMELA MONTROYA an individual (hereafter known as "Donor") and Johnson County, Texas c/o Johnson County Historical Commission (Hereafter known as JCHC).

**Whereas**, Donor desires to donate personal property to JCHC to enable JCHC to exhibit and display said personal property in furtherance of Johnson County's preservation of historic cultural resources and to display said personal property for the benefit of the citizens of Johnson County, Texas; and

**Whereas**, Johnson County is a political subdivision of the State of Texas which provides services for the citizens of Johnson County; and

**Whereas**, JCHC is authorized to act and does act by and through the Commissioners Court of Johnson County, Texas pursuant to V.T.C.A. Local Government Code Section 81.032 to accept donations of personal property.

**THEREFORE, DONOR AND JCHC AGREE AND UNDERSTAND THE FOLLOWING:**

Donor does hereby offer to donate and transfer complete and absolute ownership to JCHC the personal property listed and described and incorporated herein.

For a donation to be accepted, such donation, after being offered by Donor, must be accepted and approved by both JCHC at a regularly scheduled meeting and by Commissioners Court of Johnson County, Texas in an open session.

Personal Property donated to JCHC may not be returned to the Donor after acceptance and approval by both JCHC and by the Commissioners Court of Johnson County, Texas.

Upon acceptance and approval by both JCHC and the Commissioners Court of Johnson County, Texas complete and absolute ownership of the donated personal property transfers to JCHC and is subject to the current laws of the State of Texas or as it may hereinafter be amended.

**General Terms and Conditions between Donor and JCHC:**

1. No item(s) shall be left at the JCHC Courthouse Museum without an attached, signed donor form including the Donor's complete name, physical and mailing addresses, phone numbers and email.
2. A photograph of each item shall be attached to its Memorandum of Donation form.
3. Age, historic significance (especially to Johnson County, Texas) and rarity of the proposed donation(s) shall be considered by JCHC on an individual basis.
4. Large items or items requiring special handling or storage cannot be accepted at this time.
5. JCHC reserves the right to decline any donation. If not accepted by JCHC, Donor has thirty (30) days to retrieve their item(s). After 30 days, disposition shall be at the discretion of JCHC Executive Committee.

When the bread was baked the little red hen said,






## Texas State J. C. L. Holds Executive Session In Waco

### Port Arthur Chapter Observes Latin Day April 9

Joining the statewide observance of Latin Week, April 12-16, the Port Arthur Chapter of the Junior Classical League proclaimed April 9 as Latin Day at Thomas Jefferson Senior High School with special program in the Latin classes.

Highlighting the celebration, the Latin students saw a movie, "The Revolt of the Gladiators," depicting the life of the Romans in the time of Julius Caesar.

Throughout the day each Latin class held its own quiz and discussion of Roman culture.

Betty Quincer, Lena Whitman, and Wanda Richards were announced as first, second and third place winners respectively in the local theme contest sponsored by *The Torch*. The local winning themes competed in the state contest.

Completing the Latin Day observance, the league held formal initiation ceremonies for eighteen new members.

### Forest Avenue Chapter Observes Latin Week

Latin Week at Forest Avenue was spread over more than one week. In the April 14th edition of the *Echo*, school paper, was an article written by Miss Edna Rowe, English teacher and senior counselor at Forest Avenue, on *The Importance of Latin*. Articles by Judge W. H. Atwell and the Honorable Gerald C. Mann will be published in the next edition of the *Echo*. Posters on bulletin boards in the halls and in the room made an attractive display to answer the question: *Why Study Latin?*

In *The Dallas News* and the *Dallas Times-Herald* were printed editorials on Latin during the week of April 12-16.

Dr. John H. McGinnis of Southern Methodist University addressed the school assembly Monday, April 26.

On Tuesday, April 27, "The Roman Slave Girl" was given at the regular meeting of the Latin Club to which guests were invited.

Latin Week closed with the annual Latin Club Banquet on Friday, April 30. At the meeting, which is always held on the last Friday in April, the new members of the J. C. L. were announced. To win membership this term, pupils were required to learn the vocabulary for their year in the Latin Tournament.

The final event will be the annual Latin Club picnic on Tuesday, May 4.

Members of the Paris High J. C. L. published their Latin magazine *Hodie et Hari* during Latin Week. The Latin Week issue is an excellent one and contains valuable information on *Why Study Latin*.

### Roman Atmosphere Prevails at Marshall High Latin Club Banquet

A table decorated in the Roman manner, with ivy garlands and white flowers, was the setting for the Marshall High School Latin Club banquet given during Latin Week.

Joe Carter acted as toastmaster. Charles Myler gave accordion numbers.

During the program, extemporaneous one-minute speeches were given by Mrs. Bill Sullivan, sponsor, Carol Thomas, and Edgar Allen.

J. Davis Hill, principal of the high school, gave a short address.

As a result of the efforts of the Marshall High School Chapter during Latin Week to increase interest in Latin, a tabulation of the number of students to take Latin next year showed an increase of over five hundred per cent of the present Latin class.

### Paschal High Student Finds Latin Practical Today

Ken Garrett, student in Paschal High, Fort Worth, had the value of studying Latin very advantageously brought to his attention recently. He took the Army and Navy A-12 and V-12 Test for the Procurement of Officers, in which vocabulary and the exact knowledge of the English language counted approximately fifty per cent of the entire score.

In recounting his impressions to the Latin class afterward, Ken said: "There were Latin words everywhere I looked. I did not have to look for them. I certainly used my knowledge of Latin. I imagine the boys who failed were chiefly those that had not ever had Latin."

Of course, that is just one man's opinion; but Ken is a very bright boy.

### Bill Bailey Elected President Of West Junior Chapter For Spring Term

At the first meeting of the West Junior, Waco, Chapter of the J. C. L. Bill Bailey was elected president for the spring term. Other officers were elected as follows: Frances Dossett, vice-president; Ethel DeJarnette, secretary; Ann Trautschold, treasurer; Ada Stone, parliamentarian; Cynthia Littlefield, reporter; and Tommy Riggs, sergeant-at-arms.

Approximately thirty-five of the forty members attended a Latin banquet sponsored by the Waco High J. C. L. during Latin Week. Members of the West Junior Chapter and the North Junior Chapter presented a skit, "A Trip Through Roman History" at the banquet.

### Conference and Luncheon Scheduled for Saturday, May 29

The Texas State Junior Classical League will hold an executive session and conference at the Central Christian Church in Waco on Saturday, May 29. A luncheon will be held in the banquet room on the third floor of the church at 12:30 o'clock. Following the luncheon, a business session will be held, and officers will be elected for the coming year.

Each chapter is urged to make an effort to have its sponsor and at least two student representatives present. One of these student delegates shall be designated to serve on the Nominating Committee. Both shall vote on officers nominated and other matters if it is not possible to have a third delegate from the chapter to cast the votes for the chapter.

Each chapter may nominate one officer from its membership, if desirable, but only one. Where it is not possible to send delegates from a chapter to conduct business at the executive session and conference, nominations may be submitted in writing and should be sent to Miss Elor Osborn, Waco High School, Waco, Texas, by Friday, May 21. Qualifications should be stated.

If only two delegates represent a chapter, then that chapter may send a written report on the year's activities including Latin Week.

Each chapter is asked to send written suggestions on Program of Work for 1943-1944.
